

Pastor's Column

I ride a nice bicycle. I bought it years ago in Wisconsin. It's not an elite, hyper expensive bike. But it does have disc brakes, 18 speeds, and it shifts like butter.

My best bicycle riding memories were with that Schwinn Varsity I rode back in Junior High days. At the approach of a downhill slope I'd bear down heavily in 10th gear to work up velocity. Speeding down hills as fast as a desert wind, it felt like flying. Now that I'm a senior citizen, I shy away from too much downhill velocity.

We lived up on Barge Street in Yakima, WA. The Schwinn Varsity glided downhill to get to friends' houses or school or the downtown YMCA. Going downhill I knew I would have to return home going uphill. There was no way to avoid it. I could go uphill on Tieton Drive, uphill on Knob Hill Blvd., or uphill on Summit Ave. But to get home meant pedaling uphill.

The most epic journey on that Schwinn Varsity ten speed was after my family had moved to an Oregon suburb, Lake Oswego. I had friends from church in a neighboring suburb, Tigard, OR. Interstate 5 runs thru Oregon north to south. Interstate 5 there is what Interstate 90 or Interstate 80 is here. The day I rode from Lake Oswego to Tigard I actually bicycled on Interstate 5. This was 1968. Oregon had not yet "filled up". There was zero traffic that foggy summer morning on Interstate 5. I felt emboldened. I maneuvered from the shoulder where I had been pedaling. I rode out onto the middle of the right lane on Interstate 5. I marveled to myself, "Amazing! I'm on a bicycle on an Interstate highway and there are no cars!"

When I first moved to Ashtabula, Dick Reinker told me one of the many manufacturing sites here made gear sprockets for Schwinn bicycles. That was so cool to learn that. So the Schwinn ten-speed I pedaled safely down Interstate 5 had sprockets manufactured here Ashtabula. That Schwinn Varsity I loved so much got stolen one night off our front porch. I never rode it again. If per chance an impossible miracle would occur and I'd recover that bike, I think I'd name it Rose Bud. But that's a whole other movie.

What's it like riding a bicycle around Ashtabula? Nowadays I worry about dogs a lot more. Aggressive dogs have permeated our households in America. The side streets here are really crummy. Yes, the city has done a great job of re-surfacing the main arterials. But if you get on a back street the roads are as craggy and rough as the aging teeth on my lower jaw. People are nice in Ashtabula. You approach them and nod and say, "Hi" and they to say "hi" in return. It's always nice to meet other bicyclists and compare equipment.

Bicycling is interesting. To pedal forward you push our foot downward. Because you push down on a pedal, you go round and around. The pedal in rounding motion is attached to round sprocket. Front round sprocket connects via chain to rear round sprocket. Chain goes round and around from front to rear. Without the dynamic of going round, bicycling would not happen. Bicycling is an interconnection of circles. The circles interconnect in such a way that motion happens.

One depiction of God is God is circle. God is that circle whose center point is everywhere and whose circumference is nowhere. Circle is symbol of the eternal nature of God. It just goes round and round and just is. But God as circle is in motion. God is constant motion of grace and preservation. God is constantly moving into our bodies and souls. The God who journeys to us invites us to journey along in God's good and healing ways.

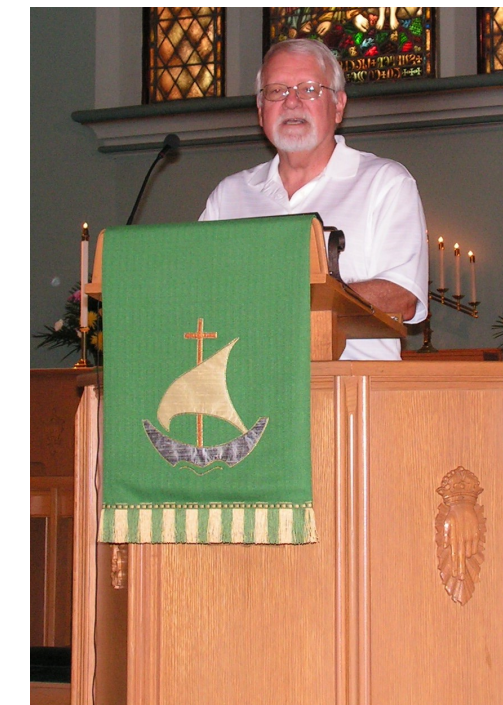
About 15 children attended VBS each day and the leaders thought it was a very good School.
