It always amazes me how much preparation is part of living. For example, consider the preparation of the "Messenger". I write this article on December 26th, the 2nd Day of Christmas. Lanny will edit articles & photos. Volunteers will fold and insert the "Messenger" on December 31st, the 7th Day of Christmas. Cathy will prepare "Messengers" for bulk mailing for the post office. They'll probably arrive at our homes on January 2nd, the 9th Day of Christmas.

I think of all the preparation that went into the Advent Christmas cycle at Messiah. Tina planned the caroling. Martha planned the altar guild set up. Kathleen planned the Christmas decorations. Julie and Debra and Ed planned the music. The resulting sight and sound led us into the celebration of the incarnation.

Two preparation stories come to mind from the bible. The week of His death, Jesus' disciples approach Him and ask, "Where will you have us prepare the Passover?" They have no idea that meal will become Jesus' promise of forgiveness, community, and future feasting among the saints. For them, initially, this was just another religious holiday meal. For them, and for us, that

meal instituted weekly feasting on Christ as Bread of Life. The other preparation story is only in John's gospel. Pilate presents Jesus for crucifixion. He tells the crowd, "Here is your king!" The mob replies, "Away with him, crucify him!" John adds, "This happened about noon, on the Day of Preparation." In other words, as lambs are being slaughtered for Passover meal, Jesus, Lamb of God, is presented for crucifixion.

How were your preparations for Christmas this year? Did the shopping go OK? Did the menu work out? Did the decorations look all right? Did everything get cleaned up? Did the conversations flow and laughter fill the air? We look back on our events and realize the preparation is often as joyful as the event itself. And so we begin 2019. We live that cycle of preparation / event. God is in both of them, preparation and event. And so there is grace, calling, and joy.

Review of Activities of Messiah

(This is part three of a handwritten history by an unknown author found in the archives by Hal Cooper)

The synod constitution was adopted. It was also decided to petition the Conference and Synod for admission to membership and to incorporate the Church according to the laws of the State of Ohio. The single envelope system for dues was adopted.

A Committee of 5 was appointed to raise \$10,000 for a Bldg Fund, to call special meeting for to call Pastor soon as a Deed had been secured on chapel?

All felt happy, on account of this birth of the new congregation despite the fact we did not have a house (The chapel was not yet our own), No money and No pastor. But right down in the bottom of our hearts we felt that God was with us and we would succeed. On Monday evening April 11th, 1921 the church council called a special meeting to call Pastor Rev. Otto O. Oleen of the Capernaum, being the candidate selected by church council. Rev. Oleen was unanimously called to be Pastor of Messiah.

The call was accepted and after serving both Capernaum and Messiah until Sept. 1921 he took charge of the new Congregation. The Capernaum congregation gave the Messiah Congregation a deed of the chapel. Now we had a house even though crowded. In April 1921 an addition was built on to the Chapel to an expense of \$342.00. I will just mention this on account of it shows how eager we were to get room for the people at our services.

We had services on Sunday. On Monday morning early 14 men started work on this addition. Worked steady all week, doing the laying of pillars, carpenter work, Elec. wiring, Painting and at 10 o'clock next Saturday eve the job was completed, so we could hold services on Sunday following. Later on the basement was enlarged.

At special meeting May 17, 1921 the committee appointed previously to look after a new site for building a new church made a report. Several sites suitable for church were reported amongst which was ours at 59 Prospect St. 84 X 247 ft owned by A O Amsden sons?. It was decided to give the committee full authority to purchase this property and it was bought for the sum of \$10,000.00.

The old house on this property was later remodeled and in Sept. 1921 Rev. Oleen with family moved in and used same for parsonage until 1925. At yearly meeting Jan. 8, 1924 a committee of 7 was appointed to raise funds for a new church. On Wednesday eve the 23rd of April, 1924 a special meeting was held to decide the question of purchasing another lot on Station ave with a frontage of 50 ft. and a depth of 72 ft. It was decided to buy the property at the price \$1600.00.
