

Pastor’s Column

When Messiah’s faithful volunteers are assembling this issue of “The Messenger”, I am far away. I’m in New York, with Mary. We’re on Keuka Lake. We’re celebrating our 40th wedding anniversary. (My son Jacob once teased me, “Wedding Anniversary? Oh, you mean what mom refers to as Black Saturday?”)

Mary and I were married at her home church, Resurrection Lutheran in Portland, Oregon. They were a congregation well known for their moderation in a time when their denomination had grown severe and unyielding. Resurrection helped form another group that became instrumental in urging the 1988 merger that would become our ELCA.

Weather was perfect that wedding date, June 4th in 1977. It was Oregon. Summer weather is always perfect in Oregon. Temps rarely exceed 76 degrees and humidity is unnoticeable. There are no sweaty bridesmaids at Oregon weddings, no heat exhaustion among the grooms-men.

The wedding service went well. We used the new format suggest by ILCW – Inter Lutheran Commission on Worship. That group edited the LBW, what we fondly remember as the Green Book. So our wedding liturgy was the prototype of what would be published in LBW.

The buffet dinner, at Resurrection’s easily accessed fellowship hall, was awesome. I’m sure I avoided any chicken dishes that may have been offered. After the church dinner, families and friends gathered at Mary’s parents’ house. Then it was off to the honeymoon. Mary and I toured Eastern Oregon, the Oregon Coast, and Olympic National Forest in Washington. Our honeymoon vehicle was a 1976 Ford Pinto Station Wagon. Mary learned how to drive a stick shift on that trip. She did quite well.

I’ll always relate our wedding week to a major sports event. On June 5th the Portland Trailblazers won the NBA Finals. In Oregon, the Blazers are the only game in town. There is no NFL there, no major league baseball. Oregon has nothing that compares with Ohio State football. When the Trailblazers won game six, as NBC Sports played Queen’s “We Are the Champions”, the whole state went into celebration.

On June 4th in 1977 we had no idea where future would take us. We never would have guessed inner city ministry in Seattle, campus ministry in Portland, urban ministry in Minnesota, small town ministry in Wisconsin, and now Messiah in Ashtabula (we saved the best for last). In 1977 we never would have imagined spending our 40th Anniversary in New York State. There are fewer years ahead of us in terms of quantity, but the quality of good surprises ahead of us makes us excited to launch the next day together. Thanks, Mary! I love you. You formed me so deeply. You always help me do the right thing.
