Pastor's Column

So, how's your summer going?

Have you gone on vacation yet or is it later in summer? Do you find yourself lingering outside just to soak up the sun after a long Ohio winter? Does summer humidity bother you so you think about moving to the Southwest because, "at least Arizona has a DRY heat." Have you attended a wedding this summer or gone to a wedding anniversary? Has there been a funeral that surprised your summer schedule? Do you like the sound of kids playing outside? Do you find it annoying when neighbors set off fireworks before the 4th of July? Do you enjoy doing exterior house maintenance you cannot do in the winter? Do you find yourself thinking, "The summer is great, but I wonder how the Buckeyes will look this fall?" Do you agree that after a day of heavy yard work, nothing cuts thru the thirst like a nice, cold beer? Have you noticed the birds grow more silent as summer progresses? Have you noticed the honey bees really are disappearing (my yard had no bees of any kind this year)? Do you have a destination you ALWAYS go to in summer, no matter what? The bible has only a few references to summer. A bad guy named Eglon was in his summer cooling parlor when he met his grizzly death at the hands of Ehud (Judges 3). The prophet Amos (chapter 3) was critical of those distant, cultural elites who pampered themselves in their summer homes while ignoring the plight of their community.

The bible has many references to the sun. That's because sun plays so strong a role in agriculture, time, and navigation. Sunlight is also metaphor for God's brilliant and shining light (Revelation 1:16). Interestingly, there are no stories of Jesus and the disciples enjoying the sunsets over Lake Galilee. There is a reference to Jesus awakening early in the day in order to pray (Mark 1:15). Perhaps he was a morning person, preferring sunrise over sunset.

How many summers have you lived? I was born in summer. So this June, my 63rd birthday, I noted that I have lived thru 64 summers. How many more summers remain for you and for me? God knows. God will love us thru them all. Whether it is seasons of nature or life stages, there is always calling. Grace calls us thru seasons and stages to know our true selves and to become our true selves. Every season of nature or life holds the possibility for transformation. We may become something new and different at season's end. Grow well thru the remainder of summer 2017 and on into fall, winter, and spring!



Lutheran History

June 25th is an important date in Lutheran History. On this day in 1530 Lutheran theologians presented the Augsburg Confession. Emperor Charles V had summoned this conference in Augsburg, Germany to end the strife brought by the reformation. Luther's protégé Philip Melanchthon wrote the Augsburg confession. Luther was not able to attend the conference as he did not have safe passage in Augsburg. Luther waited in nearby Coburg Castle while his colleagues presented this document that is honored as the primary identification of Lutheran theology.
